Jonathan Barr, CADC-I, CPS-AD, MATS

Program Manager, PROUD Program - Advantage Behavioral Health Systems

Jonathan Barr is a person in long term recovery, a returned citizen, and a Certified Addiction Recovery Empowerment Specialist (CARES). He graduated Hall County Drug Court in June of 2016. Jonathan then moved to Athens Georgia to help start Acceptance Recovery Center before ultimately making another move to help start a program to serve peers with OUD. He currently works at Advantage Behavioral Health Systems as the Program Manager for the PROUD (Peers in Recovery from Opioid Use and Dependency) Program. He works daily with those seeking recovery to help them find freedom from substance misuse, improved quality of life, and meaningful connection with others. Jonathan has been working in the field for over 8 years, is a certified MRT instructor, is additionally certified as a CADC (Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor), and is a Medication Assisted Treatment Specialist (MATS) through the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Certification Board of Georgia. He considers his work not just a job, but a calling. Jonathan is currently attending Georgia State University and is studying social work. His long-term goal is to become a fully licensed clinician and to someday start and/or run his own agency.

Dr. Brunner has been involved in leadership of the Minnesota Society of Addiction Medicine and is now on the national board of the American Society of Addiction. She is a passionate advocate for improving the care of patients with substance use disorder across the healthcare system, and specifically in advocating for increased utilization of medications for opioid use disorder across all levels of care. She has also been recognized as a Top Doctor for addiction medicine by Minnesota Magazine in 2020, 2021 and 2022.

Dr. Delisi is board certified by both the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and the American Board of Addiction Medicine. Before joining the YourPath team as CMO and President, Dr, Delisi had served as a psychiatrist for the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation from 2005-2023. During his time with Hazelden, Dr. Delisi most recently served as Medical Director, Enterprise Solutions. Dr. Delisi continues as an Adjunct Professor at the Hazelden Betty Ford Graduate School and as an On-call Medical Trainer. Dr. Delisi is a nationally recognized leader, speaker, and

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consultant on the use of evidence-based, integrated treatments for co-occurring and substance use disorders, as well as the risk conferred by the epigenetic effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences and trauma.

Andy Gish, RN, BSN, CEN

Director - Georgia Overdose Prevention

Andy is a Board-Certified Emergency Room Nurse who helped pass Georgia's Medical Amnesty Law better known as "Don't Run, Call 911". This law allows certain legal protections for the victim and caller when 911 is used in cases of medical emergencies related to drug and alcohol overdoses. The law also allowed statewide access to Naloxone/Narcan, the antidote for opioid overdoses, for almost 10 years before it became over-the-counter.

Andy is the Director of Georgia Overdose Prevention where she oversees state-wide community outreach and distribution of Naloxone to people at high risk and their loved ones. She also works closely with Georgia Harm Reduction Coalition who is now establishing Syringe Service Programs all over the State of Georgia. The work of these organizations has resulted in over 9,200 known community overdose reversals in Georgia. Andy is a guest lecturer at Emory University, The University of West Georgia and PCOM teaching future health care providers about opioid addiction and Georgia's Medical Amnesty Law. She has also taught at the CDC, The Department of Public Health and Georgia Poison Control and has organized several opioid education programs including a summit for law enforcement at The Carter Center. Her focus is on compassionate open-minded care and de-stigmatizing this marginalized population. She is a graduate of Emory University's Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing where she served as Class President.

In 2018, Andy won the AJC's Nursing Excellence award and was named one of the Top 10 Nurses in Georgia for her work in Overdose Prevention. That year she was also given a Commander's Challenge Coin from RAMD Edward M. Dieser, the Chief Engineer of the U.S. Public Health Service under the Office of the Surgeon General for her work in Public Health. In 2020, she was presented with Emory's Excellence in Nursing Award from the Alumni Association.

Andy was a long-term resident of Atlanta's Little Five Points where much of her community outreach started and where she continues to serve. She equips and trains restaurants, bars and other businesses in her community with Naloxone and detailed education on how to treat and prevent overdoses. This effort has resulted in many community reversals of overdoses where Good Samaritans saved victims of overdoses. Andy is a former anthropologist and primate researcher and is also a musician and published singer songwriter for the group The Yum Yum Tree.

Kallio Hunnicutt-Ferguson, PhD

Kallio Hunnicutt-Ferguson, PhD completed her PhD in clinical psychology at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine, internship at the New Jersey VA Healthcare System, and a Postdoctoral Fellowship at Weill Cornell Medicine. Prior to joining the Emory University School of Medicine Faculty in 2017, Dr. Hunnicutt worked as the PTSD/Substance Use Disorder psychologist at the James J. Peters VA in Bronx, NY. Dr. Hunnicutt specializes in providing

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Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and other evidence based treatments to adults with substance use disorders and co-occurring mood, anxiety, trauma and related disorders. Dr. Hunnicutt is actively involved in research and prevention efforts focused on substance use disorders and their impact on women's health. She is passionate about teaching, and is the director of psychology practicum training at Emory clinic and is involved in residency education.
